



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As I stated in the previous article, I am not sure what the solution to this problem is. There are real people struggling deeply with their gender identities. At the same time, allowing bathrooms and locker rooms to be accessible to transgender people raises lots of fears and concerns for others. The fear is not necessarily of transgender people, but of others

who might take advantage of the law and perpetrate violence and/or abuse against women and children. As a country, we seem to be at a standoff with no compromise in sight.

With so much that is out of our control, I think it helpful to do our best to try and understand the issues at

hand. It helps to humanize the people on both sides of the debate: including those living as a gender other than their biology indicates and those who have an incarnational view of gender (that it should not be altered, because God created people male and female in His image). In his book Understanding Gender Dysphoria: Navigating Transgender Issues in a Changing Culture, Mark

Yarhouse has identified three "frameworks" or "lenses" that people use when thinking about this topic. They are 1) the integrity framework, 2) the disability framework, and 3) the diversity framework. I will discuss the integrity framework in this article.

Before I go further, I want to explain why it is important to understand these three different per-

> spectives. Bottom line, they are so different that it is almost like they require us to speak different languages. For a Christian who has a strong belief that male and female are direct reflections of the intentions and character of God, the idea of messing with gender is a really big deal. For somewho one sees transgender as another

of God's unique creations to be celebrated, "male" and "female" may not be as connected to the essence of who God is to them. It can be a real challenge to communicate when the starting places are so far apart from one another. This is especially true when we don't realize how far apart we actually are. Understanding that there may be a big disconnect

Pornography was pretty inaccessible for those my age back then-you could have found someone's stash of Playboys, ran across some adult magazines in a field or when really desperate, thumbed through the swimsuit or underwear section of the JC Penney catalog. In our current culture, a weeks' worth of pornography is available at a single click through almost every electronic device we own. way this impacts men, women and youth emotionally, psychologically and the effects on the human brain are astounding, for which I empathize a great deal. Yet, we



have the rough daily battle of pleasing the Lord by seeking sexual integrity in our lives and Where Grace Abounds wants to help out with any resource that can be supportive. Internet filtering and accountability software programs have been very helpful to me personally and there are many out there from which to choose. Here are just a few that we recommend:

NET NANNY



Net Nanny offers 3 different packages based on your needs-\$39.99 per year

for one computer or family packages that are \$69.99 or 89.99 per year. Net Nanny is usable on Windows, MacOS, Android, and iOS devices. Net Nanny has been at or near the top of the parental control software ratings for many years. The filtering and blocking features offered are versatile and effective, as are the recording and reporting features. In 2014 there was no screenshot playback, but that shortcoming has been rectified. Net Nanny is relatively easy to

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install and configure, it is usable on almost any device, and it's priced right.

website, a Christian non-profit aimed at helping those who struggle with pornography. This monitoring software works on all devices, with one account and one report and is available on Mac, PC, I-phone, I-pad or Android devices. There are 2 packages available. A basic plan for \$24.99 year or a premium plan with bonus features for \$64.99. Be sure to check out all the available resources on the XXX Church website—there are some good ones.

COVENANT EYES

Covenant Eyes offers individual filtering and ac-

countability (two separate programs). They carry 2 packages: A Personal account (for individuals or couples without kids) for \$10.99 a month or a family package (families with children) for \$14.99 per month. Covenant Eyes is useable on Windows, MacOS,

iOS and Android devices, though Android devices do not have access to the full range of features. One drawback with Covenant Eyes is that users pay monthly, which could get expensive over time.

In Yarhouse's words, one using the integrity framework

> views sex and gender and, therefore, gender identity conflicts in terms of "the sacred integrity of maleness and femaleness stamped on one's

body." Crossgender identification is a concern in large part because it threatens the integrity of male-female distinctions [T]he theological concerns rest in the denial of the integrity of one's own sex and an overt attempt at marring the sacred image

of maleness or femaleness formed by God.¹

Those coming from the "integrity" perspective tend to be conservative theologically speaking. They may be quite compassionate regarding the deep struggle of a person trying to come to terms with their gender identity, but regard biological maleness or femaleness as the key factor in its resolution. Most from this perspective would be concerned cross-gender about behavior. from minimal cross-dressing to the more more invasive, surgical options that attempt to match biology with gender identity.

Those who espouse the "integrity" perspective need to be cautious on several fronts. While in most cases biological gender is

clear (with the exception of intersex people, whose biology is

ambiguous), the definitions of gender roles and gender behaviors can be quite subjective and vary wildly from culture to culture. Our own cultural ideas of what it means to be a man or a woman have changed significantly over the past 50 years. For example, whereas men were once

the primary or sole wage earners, now most families have two working parents, often with the female earning more money. Many cultural norms have been turned on their heads since WWI. Another reason for caution is that we live in a fallen world. The perfection we were designed for has not existed since sin entered the world. It stands to reason that


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even our DNA is affected sin. We don't know enough about what causes gender dysphoria, but it is likely a mixture of genetic and environmental elements.

Here are some final thoughts to consider before I wrap this up. Amongst the LGBTQ+ community, the rate of suicide is the highthose dealing transgender issues. These people are often the targets for bullying and violence. Many believe that if transgender people would simply stop cross-dressing and live out their biological genders, violence would subside. Perhaps this would reduce violence against them. But consider this: all of the behaviors associated with transgender are about reducing anxiety. Despite the very real threats of violence and harm they face, they feel less anxious when cross-dressed or pursuing gender reassignment. I don't know if a person who is not gender dysphoric can fully understand the level of discomfort a transgender person lives with just being in their own skin.

Next month, we will look at the "disability" framework and explore what it means and how it relates to the "integrity" framework.
